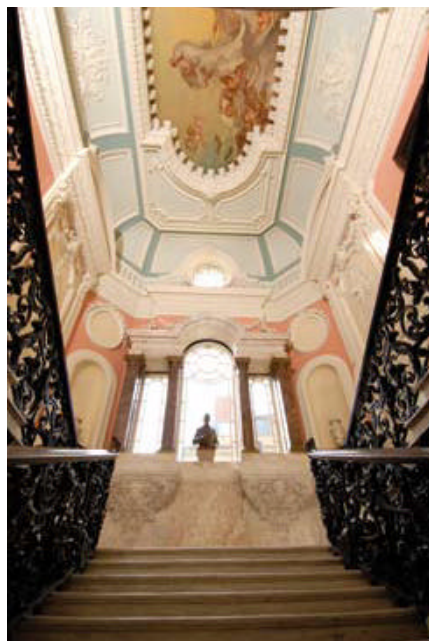

This year the BFSA Debate has moved temporarily from its usual January date to June. It will take place in Dartmouth House, 37 Charles Street, Mayfair, London, on 2nd June at 7.00pm with a wine and canapés reception afterwards. Our impressive panel includes US Diplomats Greg Barry and Sandra Kaiser, Fulbright scholar James Crabtree, author and journalist David Aaronovitch, Liam Fox MP and Lord Hannay, Chair of the United Nations Association in the UK. The debate, "In Sickness and in Health: Sustaining the Special Relationship" – will focus on the current global financial crisis, a new US President, terrorism, and the recent historic G20 summit held in London.

BFSA PATRON SIR GAVIN LIGHTMAN

The BFSA committee and members are delighted to announce The Honourable Mr Justice Lightman (Sir Gavin Lightman) has agreed to become the first patron of the association.

In 1961 Gavin Lightman obtained a first class degree in law at University College London (of which he has been elected a Fellow) and in 1962 a Master's degree at the University of Michigan. He has taught at the University of Sheffield and at Merton College Oxford. He was called to the Bar in 1963 and appointed Queen's Counsel in 1980. He had a very large and wide-ranging litigation practice both in this country and abroad (and in particular) in Singapore and Hong Kong. His clients included Playboy, Private Eye and (in his successful fight to establish the Globe Theatre) Sam Wanamaker. In 1994 he was appointed a judge of the High Court assigned to the Chancery Division. In 1996 he was also nominated a judge of the Administrative Court and in 1997 was assigned as a judge of the

Competition Court. He has given a number of important judgments in the fields of insolvency, court procedure, mediation, trusts, intellectual property and administrative law. As well as having co-authored a case book on Real Property Law, he has written, with Gabriel Moss QC, **Lightman & Moss on The Law of Administrators and Receivers of Companies**, which has now become the leading work on Administrators and Receivers.

He is a frequent speaker and writer of articles on these subjects and in other areas of public and professional interest e.g. pensions, legal process and legal education.

Gavin Lightman did his Fulbright year at Michigan University in 1961.

BFSA DEBATE PANNELLISTS



Sandra Kaiser

Minister-Counselor for Public Affairs at the US Embassy. Ms Kaiser is a career diplomat with 22 years experience in public diplomacy. She has previous diplomatic experience in Germany, Greece, Estonia, Brazil and Denmark, where she guided the U.S. response to the Mohammed cartoon crisis in 2006. Ms. Kaiser was awarded the Department of State's Lois Roth Award for Excellence in Public Diplomacy for her work with Greek media in the aftermath of 9/11. She graduated from San Francisco State University with a B.A. in journalism and international relations in 1983 and worked as an environmental journalist and freelance writer in San Francisco.



David Aaronovitch

David Aaronovitch is of the UK's high-profile journalists and commentators on current affairs, most recently with The Times. David Aaronovitch is well known for his television work - he was executive producer of the BBC television series The Blair Years - and appears regularly on Question Time.

His recently published book **Voodoo Histories: The Role of the Conspiracy Theory in Shaping Modern History**, reveals his fascination with some of the more arcane aspects of public life and debate.



Liam Fox

Shadow Secretary of State for Defence and Member of Parliament. Liam Fox was appointed Parliamentary Private Secretary to Home Secretary Michael Howard in June 1993. He has been Senior Government Whip, a Minister at the FCO, Opposition Spokesman on Constitutional Affairs, Shadow Secretary of State for Health, and Shadow Foreign Secretary. Since December 2005 he has been the Shadow Secretary of State for Defence. Prior to that he was a Civilian Army Medical Officer, a divisional surgeon for St Johns and a GP. Mr Fox sits on the Advisory Council of The Atlantic Bridge which was set up to strengthen the Special Relationship and further education on both sides of the Atlantic in areas of common interest.



Lord Hannay

was educated at Oxford and entered the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in 1959, with initial postings to Tehran and Kabul. He was involved in negotiating the UK's entry into the EC and from 1979 to 1983 was Under-Secretary (European Communities) at the FCO. He was a minister at the British Embassy in Washington DC before being promoted to ambassador and permanent representative to the European Communities.

From 1990 to 1995 he was ambassador and permanent representative to the United Nations. He was a member of the UN Secretary-General's High-Level Panel on Threats, Challenges and Change, and since January 2006 has been Chair of the Board of UNA-UK. He was made a Life Peer in 2001.



Gregory Berry

Minister Counselor for Political Affairs at the US Embassy.

Mr. Berry is a veteran of the State Department's Bureau of Near Eastern Affairs who established American diplomatic relations in Libya in 2006. He has also served in the US Foreign Service in Egypt, Amman, Beirut and Jerusalem. Mr. Berry received his bachelor's degree from the University of Mississippi and his master's degree and doctorate from Yale University.



James Crabtree

James Crabtree is a senior editor of Prospect magazine. He was formerly Public Services Director at the Institute for Public Policy Research and a Policy Advisor at the Prime Minister's Strategy Unit. He was educated at the London School of Economics and Political Science and at Kennedy School of Government. He did his Fulbright year in Public Policy at Harvard in 2005.

SCOTTISH GOVERNMENT/FULBRIGHT COMMISSION

NEW PARTNERSHIP



On 15 January 2009 the Scottish Executive hosted a reception for Fulbright scholars, alumni and other members of the higher education community where the new partnership between the Fulbright Commission and the Scottish Government was formally announced. Under the new agreement the US-UK Fulbright Commission is to receive £180,000 from the Scottish Government to en-

able it to expand its academic exchange activities in Scotland and further the education links between the two countries.

In a press release issued by the Scottish Govern-

ment, Fiona Hyslop, MSP and Cabinet Secretary for Education and Lifelong Learning, noted the importance of the new partnership stating,

“The Scottish Government is determined to create a self-confident, outward looking Scotland and to increase the skills of our people to help the nation emerge strongly from the current economic downturn. The US-UK Fulbright Commission has a key

role to play in supporting that by promoting the educational links between Scotland and the USA and offering grants for students, academics and professionals to undertake exchange opportunities to enrich their knowledge and skills.

The funding we have announced today - £60,000 a year for three years - will help extend the programme and enable more individuals from Scotland to take part. It will improve the universal employability of participants from Scotland while also enabling home institutions and employers to benefit from the skills and knowledge of those returning from overseas or those visiting Scotland on an exchange.”

Executive Director Penny Egan and Liza Davis, Cultural Attaché at the US Embassy, London, spoke of their excitement and enthusiasm for the new agreement.

Commission’s new relationship with Scotland and recently received a Knighthood in the Queen’s New Year Honours list for Public Service in Scotland.

New Commissioner Dr. Janet Lowe is a former Principal of Lauder College, Dunfermline, a position she held for 10 years. During her 30-year career in further and higher education, she also held posts at the University of Hull, Napier University in Edinburgh, and Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art in Dundee.

Dr. Lowe completed her research doctorate with Stirling University in 2005. In 2007 she was awarded an honorary doctorate by Queen Margaret University.

She is currently a member of the

Court of the University of Dundee and a Trustee of the Carnegie Trust for the Universities of Scotland. Her previous public service has included membership of the Garrick Committee, the Court of Heriot-Watt University, and the Boards of the Scottish Further Education Unit and Scottish Enterprise. She was a member of the independent Local Government Finance Review Committee which reported to Scottish Ministers in 2006.

Dr. Lowe was awarded the CBE in 2003 for her services to Further Education and was appointed to the Board of Skills Development Scotland in 2008. Her appointment to the Scottish Further and Higher Education Funding Council runs from 3 October 2005 to 2 October 2009.

The British Ambassador Sir Nigel Shinewald, hosted a memorable reception in March at his residence in Washington, DC, to complement the Fulbright Commission's Anniversary event in Downing Street last autumn. Alumni from all six decades, and from both side of the Atlantic, joined senior colleagues from the State Department and the Fulbright Scholarship Board to celebrate the signing of the Treaty between the two countries in the House of Commons on 22 September 1948.

Held on a snowy winter evening, the event followed on the heels of the Prime Minister's first visit to meet the new President, Barak Obama. Sir Nigel spoke eloquently about the 'special relationship' and the continued importance of the education exchange programme between the two countries.

"The US-UK Fulbright Commission is an excellent model of furthering the transatlantic relationship through academic exchange, research exchange, cultural ex-

change, and I would hope, long-lasting personal friendships developed through the programme."

His speech was followed by Simon Lewis, Chair of the US-UK Commission and Fulbright alumnus (*Berkeley 1981*) who spoke of Senator Fulbright's vision of a peaceful and prosperous world and the scholarship he founded to enable nations to immerse themselves in each other's cultures so that they might never find reason for war.

Over the last six decades, more than 27,000 Americans and Britons have crossed the Atlantic to participate in the US-UK Fulbright Programme. At the reception, the US-UK Fulbright Commission announced the first wave of new awards that will increase by 30% the number of scholarships it gives by 2010 to more than 70. The Commission also announced a new award, the Fulbright Distinguished Chair Award, to bring senior US professors to the UK. The award will be introduced to the programme in 2010.

The Mentoring Programme is underway again with over 30 Fulbright scholars coming to the UK this year. Below is a list of some of those we still need to find mentors for. NEW AMERICAN UNIVERSITY IN CAIRO

BFSA member Nadya McQueen (Boston Conservatory of Music, 1958) was invited to the opening of the AUC in Cairo earlier this year.



The above is a photograph of the new campus of The American University in Cairo, AUC, which was inaugurated by Mrs. Mubarak on Feb 7, praising it "for fostering cultural and religious understanding, promoting human understanding and breaking down barriers of prejudice and intolerance".

Founded in 1919 to offer a liberal arts education in English, the American University in Cairo has evolved into one of Egypt's premier academic institutions, educating the brightest and most capable young Egyptians as well

as international students representing over 70 countries.

For 80 years, the central campus has been located in Tahrir Square, in the heart of downtown Cairo. With no room for expansion, the university made the historic decision to acquire a 250-acre desert site in New Cairo. A planned community is being developed as a middle-to high-income residential community with schools, cultural facilities, commercial enterprises, government agencies, hotels, open spaces, parks, with the AUC campus at

its centre.

Stocked with the most advanced resources for research and scholarship, with its state-of-the-art facilities, the new campus is built to accommodate around 7000 full-time students. It contains sufficient classroom, office and laboratory space for 3 academic schools:

The School of Business, Economics and Communication.

The School of Humanities and Social Sciences.

The School of Sciences and Engineering.

The new main library, media and technology centres house the largest English-language resource in Egypt. The AUC Park and Square, with a performing and visual arts theatre, and an art gallery, inaugurated by High Highness Sheikh Dr. Sultan Bin Mohammed Al-Qassimi, are public areas where the community and AUC can interact, allowing AUC to set the pace of cultural life in the community of New Cairo.

In its concept and achievement, as well as architecturally, AUC is "awesome"!

Jane will volunteer with **Habitat for Humanity International** (HHI) to build houses in the New Orleans area so badly affected by Hurricane Katrina.

ALUMNI NEWS



THE death occurred last year at Nazareth House in Cape Town of **Father Denis Fahy** at the age of 88. Denis Edward Fahy was born in Selby, Yorkshire, and graduated with degrees magna cum laude in Philosophy and Theology from the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome. He was ordained a priest in 1943. Fr Fahy's studies continued at Campion hall, Oxford, during which time he had a Fulbright Award (1953) and presented "Thought for the Day"- a two-minute religious slot on BBC Radio.

In 1992 he was welcomed to the Diocese of Cape Town where he served at the Cathedral for four years before he became Chaplain to the Sisters at the Carmelite Convent at Wynberg.

Douglas Fisk, who did his Fulbright Award at Cornell in 1963, died on 11th December 2008. Mr Fisk had a career in business and industrial relations and had been retired for some time. His daughter, Mrs Jan Dowd wrote to the BFSa to say, "I know that my father benefitted hugely from the Fulbright programme in his younger years and without being a part of it, would never have met my (American) mother, so thank you!"

BFSa MEMBERSHIP DRIVE AND FULBRIGHT DATABASE UPDATE

The BFSa Membership Drive, co-sponsored by the US Embassy and BFSa members, has been underway since last September. In preparation for a new, more efficient, database The Fulbright Commission is working in tandem to ensure their old hard copy records correspond with information currently entered.

This is the most comprehensive update of the database undertaken and involves the slow processing and tracking of each entry via original data held at Fulbright House, the internet or other media. If you are in touch with other Fulbright alumni please ask them to get in touch with the BFSa office to update their details.

Since 2004 the BFSa has offered honorary membership to US Fulbright scholars who did their award year in the UK. If you know of, or are in touch with, any Fulbright alumni who did their scholarship here prior to that time please let the BFSa office know so that we can keep them in touch with the Fulbright network on both sides of the Atlantic.

Since the BFSa was successfully re-launched in 2001 it has developed into an organisation which provides Fulbright alumni with an increasingly valuable professional resource and network of like-minded individuals in all fields. Following the success of the alumni associations in the US, the BFSa and across Europe, other Fulbright associations are now being organised around the world to foster good international relations in a changing modern world.

The US National Academy of Science was established in 1863 during the US Civil War and had "service to the nation" as its dominant purpose. The NAS still performs an unparalleled public service by bringing together experts in all areas of scientific and technological endeavor – experts who serve *pro bono* to address critical national issues and give advice to the US federal government and the public.

The Fulbright Academy of Science & Technology (FAST) chose its name to reflect the mission and goals of the NAS and Academies of Science in other countries. Like them, FAST creates opportunities for Fulbright scholars and alumni to gather and share their knowledge and experi-

ence for the betterment of society. Based in the USA but with operations globally, FAST uses the global Fulbright network to enhance innovation and advance education, research and policy. FAST is an independent, non-partisan organization and is not affiliated with the Fulbright program or the US Department of State. Fulbright scholars and alumni in science, business, government and academia are active in the organization.

Since 2005, FAST has brought together Fulbright scholars and experts to address issues of global concern, such as health, economic development, the future of cities and the IT revolution, at conferences and workshops in Berlin, Doha, Rabat, Singapore, Boston, Skopje, and Panama City. These programs were sponsored by government agencies, corporations, foundations and universities (see website for list). FAST's individual or institutional members organize smaller, local programs to address dozens of other topics in a wide array of science and technology disciplines, such as a half-day discus-

sion last summer at LSE in London on environmental security.

The Fifth Annual FAST Conference will be in early 2010, and it will reflect back on FAST programs during its initial years while also addressing long-term issues facing the science, business and education communities. The broad theme for the conference will be Sustainability.
